The Jerusalem Foundation ensures that Jerusalem's diverse residents can continue to build a modern, open and vibrant city together. With a special focus on the social and communal needs of the city's most vulnerable populations, we close social gaps that have been exacerbated in recent times.

PROGRAMS

Springboard – improving the city of Jerusalem by taking a holistic approach to one neighborhood at a time in order to break the cycle of future poverty.

Workforce Development for Underserved Populations – culturally adapted programs to address poverty and unemployment rates among Arab women and other underserved communities.

Cross-Communal Grantmaking – supporting shared living programs that strengthen the ability of Jerusalem's residents to live together by encouraging cross-cultural and cross-communal engagement.

Shared Living Hub – Jerusalem's first hub for social change organizations promoting cross-communal dialogue in Jerusalem, empowering them to network and create partnerships.



Learning Better Together – projects which improve the level of education across the city and provide 21st century skills for underserved populations.

Support for Holocaust Survivors - Café Europa acts as a resource center for the city's Holocaust survivors, providing them with the support they need, as well as a mobile service for the homebound.



The Jerusalem Foundation leverages the city's diversity and unique history to shape its future as a modern, thriving center of arts and culture. We support cultural institutions in their efforts to create innovative new models for culture and adapt to changing realities, breathing new life into Jerusalem.

PROGRAMS

Creative Culture Grantmaking – an annual call for proposals to support innovative and collaborative arts and culture initiatives, encouraging the vibrant mosaic of Jerusalem as a diverse, pluralistic city.

Emerging Contemporary Art Platforms – 'Hamiffal' and 'A Studio of Her Own' in west Jerusalem and the Paley Arts Center in east Jerusalem serve as incubators for young artists and develop and support the local art scene.

Student Culture Festival – a platform for Jerusalem's many higher arts institutions to be part of an annual city-wide student festival to showcase Jerusalem's creativity.

The Jerusalem Foundation focuses on developing leadership and excellence in the city through its involvement in community activism and investment in the next generation. By promoting young civil leadership with a long term commitment to the city, and guaranteeing that all communities have access to opportunities to excel, we safeguard the future of Jerusalem.

PROGRAMS

Jerusalem Institute for Policy Research - JIPR is the leading applied research institute in Israel for the study of Jerusalem.

Jerusalem Foundation Scholarship Fund - this major source of funding for higher education scholarships in Jerusalem is a partnership of the Municipality, the Mifal Hapayis lottery fund and the Jerusalem Foundation.

Future Leadership Grantmaking - grants that support projects developing young leaders all across Jerusalem.

The George Pinto Jerusalem Leadership Fellows Program ('Kayma') - a group of exceptional PhD students will become the next generation of young leadership in civil society with a long-term commitment to Jerusalem.

Youth Leaders – programs to develop leadership amongst the younger generations through community activism, youth movements & at risk youth organizations.
